A city of sport

Birmingham is both proud and delighted to be hosting the Commonwealth Games in 2022. However, as our sports historians will confirm, Birmingham is a pioneer when it comes to the hosting of multi-sport festivals. In 1867, Birmingham hosted the National Olympian Games, accepted as one of the forerunners of the Modern Olympic Games. Given the city's commitment to sport, it is no surprise that the city has two original founders of the football league, hosts regular international cricket at Edgbaston Stadium, world gymnastics at Utilita Arena and is recognised as having some of the best sporting venues to be found anywhere in the world.















A city of history and heritage

Although Birmingham has grown to become the second largest city in the UK, it was only actually incorporated as a city in 1889. Prior to that, and as far back as the 12th century, Birmingham was a popular market town with Lord of the Manor, Peter De Bermingham, given royal approval to hold weekly markets close to what is now known as the Bullring. Early engineering pioneers James Watt, Matthew Boulton and William Murdock, chemist Joseph Priestley, printer John Baskerville, as well as entrepreneurial families such as Cadbury's and the Chamberlain's have all played their part in shaping the Birmingham of today.



















